



I am thrilled to announce the completion of the selection process for the 16th Annual Eagles Mere World Cup. So, dust off your sneakers, put on your game faces, and start training! In case you need a refresher, Romania claimed the

title at the last World Cup, securing an enthralling victory over El Salvador. This win earns Romania a spot in the Champions Cup, an elite tournament held every 11 years that brings together previous winners. Romania will join Canada, Sri Lanka, and Iceland in the 2028 tournament.

If you're not yet acquainted with the Eagles Mere World Cup, it's a remarkable two-day Pele Ball tournament. We assign participants to teams, each representing a different country. For the duration

The Eagles Mere World Cup is open to all Eagles aged seven and up. Participants must be available to play on both days. We also offer the Little Eagle World Cup for participants aged six and under, featuring a quick game of Pele Ball on Saturday, July 22, at 11:00 am.

AXIS OF EAGLES MERE Catching Up with Maggie Farrell!

A new issue-ly segment where we get to hear from EMAA staff members of summers past about how they are spreading their wings in the real world after countless days of EMAA experiences like reenacting Scottish Stone Throw tales, Hamburg Show lip-syncs, and refereeing World Cup.

What message do you have for the Eagles Mere community? (Say hi)

Hi Eagles Mere! All I wanted to do from the ages of 7-17 was be an Athletic Assistant. Fortunately, I got to do just that for my summers during college. For those of you who don't know me, I have now become a weekend warrior who will take any chance to get to the Town that Time Forgot, inor off-season. Seventy years ago, my grandfather's best friend brought him to Eagles Mere. Fifty-four years ago, my grandparents brought their kids to Eagles Mere for the first time, the rest is history, and we have been grass people ever since.



What is your favorite Eagles Mere memory?

Eagles Mere is my happy place and holds many of my favorite memories - making it incredibly difficult to choose just one. However, one that comes to mind is Thanksgiving 2017. My parents were in the midst of renovating the house we now live in and they took my siblings (Sarah, Katie, and Mark) and I over to the house to watch the sunset. The six of us stood on the porch, watching what would soon become a permanent fixture of our daily life in Eagles Mere, just simply taking it all in. The beauty of Eagles Mere is that there are always moments of peace to find that allows us, for a moment, to forget the chaos of the outside world.

Is there anyone (aside from family) that you keep in touch with the most from Eagles Mere?

Eagles Mere has provided me with lifelong friends, some who have seamlessly become family (cough Pendleton Family cough), and tremendous mentors. Lauren Walheim and I were on the staff together from 2012-2014 and I keep in touch with her the most, but if you were to hit the town in DC from 2018-2020 you would have seen Danny Johnson and I in our glory days, as he would call it. As for mentors, who I am so fortunate to also call friends, Amy Shapiro and Martha Brass are two incredible women who have helped me



through countless twists and turns of my careers thus far.

What was one of the biggest lessons you learned that you use in your everyday job?

During my time on the EMAA Staff, I learned the importance of being a supportive team member. It's always imperative to remember that championing the successes of those around you is just as important as celebrating your own! I know that working with a number of different staff throughout my summers taught me the importance of collaboration. I head to my job with that mindset every single day.

What have you been up to since working for the EMAA?

What a timely question, being that I just started a new job at Cristo Rey Philadelphia High School as the Director of Communications & Marketing. Cristo Rey Philadelphia is in a network of 39 schools throughout the country providing a private, Catholic education to young people of limited means. What sets their education apart is the Corporate Work-Study program. One day a week, during the school year, students report to their assigned job site to work in businesses throughout the Philadelphia



Area. Job placements range from big corporations, to small financial firms, to nonprofits like First Tee, where I first learned about the magic of Cristo Rey.

Since 2017, I spent the last six years of my career working for First Tee, both in Washington, DC and Philadelphia. First Tee is a sports-based youth development organization using the game of golf to impact young people. I moved to DC a few years after graduating from college and spent three incredible years overseeing the programming in the District and social media, among other things. I lived with my sister, Sarah, and spent a ton of time with both Danny & Peter Johnson, Margaret Nealon and Lauren Gilliss. It's always so much fun to have friends from Eagles Mere in places you don't know a soul... In early 2020, I accepted a job with First Tee in Philadelphia and swiftly moved to Eagles Mere in mid-March. During my time at First Tee in Philly, I oversaw fundraising events, development, and social media! Aside from bringing me home, with that move, I shaved 1.5 hours off my commute to Eagles Mere.

Over the last few years, I've spent a tremendous amount of time (some forced, most not) with my family and have traveled quite a bit! I also had

the pleasure and thrill of attending every Phillies postseason home game during last year's World Series run!

What was your proudest moment in your Eagles Mere?

I hope this makes people chuckle... I was about 10, it was Sports Week, and fellow former EMAA Staff Member Caroline Long came up to our spot on the grass and said, "I need kids on my boat for the Sailing Race, and you're coming." What I have failed to mention to this point, is that I was terrified of sailing. I could go on any other boat, but the likelihood of flipping

on a sailboat was much higher, so I avoided them at all costs and, therefore, never learned to sail. Caroline had convinced a few other people to go so I finally caved, for fear of missing out. No sooner do we get to the starting line, is there a clap of thunder. Immediately, Caroline screams, "Jump off and get in the water, I have to turtle the boat." I didn't even have a chance to think about what I was doing, I just jumped. After that experience, I had fully conquered my fear, and I spent every second I could, learning how to sail that summer. There were a few mishaps, including a ton of flipped boats (some I couldn't flip back over) and one incident where I sailed right into the middle section of the swimming area, but I've loved it ever since.

What is your favorite Eagles Mere activity?





A BRIEF HISTORY OF EAGLES MERE FRIENDS OF THE ARTS "ART PULLS A COMMUNITY TOGETHER." - LESTER SINCLAIR

QUICK FACTS:

- 1975 Eagles Mere Friends of the Arts founded
- Mission: Presenting professional music programs and other cultural events of high quality to the community of Eagles Mere and the surrounding area
- 1982 David A. DeWire Center built, providing a permanent home
- First Season : 2 Concerts by The Philadelphia Trio and The Philadelphia Chamber Singers
- 2023 Season: 14 Concerts, including 9 on Village Green, the East Coast Premiere of a play, 3-Day Dance Program, 13 Art, Music and Drama Classes, and 9 Weekly Brain/Food Potluck Dinners with Lectures and Film/Book Discussions

The arts have long been part of an Eagles Mere summer. During Eagles Mere's Chautauqua era, which started in 1896 and lasted less than a decade, lectures and fine arts activities were held in the Park. In later years chamber music and films were a staple at many of Eagles Mere's resort hotels. From 1945-69 Eagles Mere was home to a small summer stock theater founded by Northwestern University theatre professor Alvina Krause, who brought performers, such as Joanne Woodward, to Eagles Mere. But after World War II, one by one, the hotels began to close, as did the theatre, ending an era of regular entertainment in Eagles Mere.

In 1974 two enterprising community members, Priscilla Ryan and Debby Reeder, stepped in to fill the void by organizing a concert of The Philadelphia Trio at the Presbyterian Church. The concert was well received and prompted a group of volunteers to establish Eagles Mere Friends of the Arts in 1975.

Finding a Permanent Home at the David A DeWire Center



In the early years most events were held in the Federated Church, but many others were held where ever there was space, including lawns of private cottages, the Village Green and the Community Hall. Rain was a constant threat. When it became clear that a permanent home was needed, Friends of the Arts joined forces with the Fire Company and the Eagles Mere Athletic Association to raise over \$300,000 to construct a building on the site of the old Allegheny Hotel at 891 LaPorte Avenue. The building was completed in 1982 and two years later it was named in honor of David A. DeWire, an admired community leader, whose efforts were critical in making the project possible.

Eagles Mere's Arts Programming Has Evolved Over the Years

Our first season featured just two groups – The Philadelphia Trio and The Philadelphia Chamber Singers. Revenue from memberships, gifts, and admissions was encouraging and an expanded schedule was planned for the 1976 season. The classical music program was expanded to include songs of the Orpheus Club of Philadelphia and a Neil Simon play, "The Star Spangled Girl," the first play seen in Eagles Mere in ten years. Over the years EMFA's program has evolved in response to community interests to become the robust summer community arts center it is today.

SUMMER CONCERT SERIES



The Friends of the Arts is best known for its concerts, which have grown in number and musical styles in recent years. For many years our season starts with a performance by The Repaz Band on July 4. This year we have a full schedule of concerts on the Village Green and our mainstage in a variety of musical styles including: classic and indie rock, folk, classical, a bit of the blues, big band, and jazz. In the last few years the community have enjoyed our free familyfriendly concerts on Eagles Mere's Village Green. Main stage performances are at the David A. DeWire Center. In 2013 EMFA started hosting concerts in private homes and this year , after several years hiatus, we are hosting a members only house concert featuring SPARX, a flute and harp duo.

A TRADITION OF SPECIAL EVENTS

of our size has been able to mount professional music, art and theatre programs.

Some years ago the nationally known political comedy troup, The Capital Steps, performed at the DeWire Center. Last year kids and adults were delighted with an ariel arts performance.
